"It's important to offer events and programs for everyone in our community," said Courtney Butler, community engagement coordinator with Parks and Recreation. "We're excited that we're able to offer something for adults with disabilities, since we know that there's not a ton of things for them to do, recreation wise, that's geared specifically for them."

At the dance, there will be a concession stand with snacks and beverages. Items will cost \$1-2 each and can be paid for with cash.

"Our attendees really love having options and choices and

being able to do things for themselves," Ms. Butler said. "We have a visual menu board that they can just point to what they want."

Ms. Butler added people drive from up to an hour and a half away to attend the dance, with typically 100 to 200 people in attendance.
