Internet Auction Fraud

Listed below are tips to protect yourself and your family from various forms of Internet fraud.

AVOIDING INTERNET AUCTION FRAUD:

- Understand as much as possible about how the auction works, what your obligations are as a buyer, and what the seller's obligations are before you bid.
- Find out what actions the website/company takes if a problem occurs and consider insuring the transaction and shipment.
- Learn as much as possible about the seller, especially if the only information you have is an e-mail address. If it is a business, check the Better Business Bureau from the seller's area.
- · Examine the feedback on the seller.
- Determine what method of payment the seller is asking from the buyer and where he/she is asking to send payment.
- If possible, purchase items online using your credit card, because you can often dispute the charges if something goes wrong.
- Be cautious when dealing with sellers outside the United States.
- Ask the seller about when delivery can be expected and whether the merchandise is covered by a warranty or can be exchanged if there is a problem.
- Make sure there are no unexpected costs, including whether shipping and handling is included in the auction price.
- There should be no reason to give out your social security number or driver's license number to the seller.

AVOIDING NON-DELIVERY OF MERCHANDISE:

- Obtain a physical address and a telephone number rather than simply a post office box and call the seller to see if the telephone number is correct and working.
- Send an e-mail to the seller to make sure the e-mail address is active.
- Consider not purchasing from sellers who won't provide you with this type of information.
- · Check with the Better Business Bureau from the seller's area.
- Be cautious when responding to special investment offers, especially through unsolicited e-mail.
- Make sure the transaction is secure when you electronically send your credit card numbers.

2014 Resident Satisfaction Survey Results

n October 2014, the Community Association (CA) contracted with MOSAK Advertising and Insights to facilitate the Resident Satisfaction Survey. This survey is conducted every two years to determine resident satisfaction relative to the various programs, products, facilities and services of the CA. The Objectives of the study were to:

- Understand the level of satisfaction with each department and our amenities.
- Understand usage and satisfaction with communication tools used by the CA.
- · Understand the satisfaction with the overall operations.
- · Identify areas of improvement.

Every resident was asked to complete the survey online. MOSAK also offered hard copies of the survey at the Social Center Monitor's Desk for those not wishing to complete electronically. The survey was divided into several sections corresponding to various departments within the CA. The survey also featured a demographics section, providing us with relevant census data.

MOSAK received 2,307 homeowner responses. Results of the survey were distributed to CA management, staff and the Board of Directors. This information will help the Board and management identify areas where the CA is performing favorably as well as areas where the CA might look to make improvements. The results of this survey will continue to serve as a benchmark as we take steps to improve the CA's services in 2015 and beyond.

I am pleased to report the results of the survey were quite positive. Overall, 86% of those responding were satisfied with the services and facilities of the Community Association. Some of our findings included the following:

• Gender breakdown was fairly even, with the slight majority of participants being female (51.8%).

- Participants age 65 to 69 (28%) and 70 to 74 (28.7%) accounted for the largest segments.
- The overwhelming majority of participants (86.1%) are currently not working only 4.7% if the respondents indicated they are working full time.
- When asked about volunteering, close to half of the participants (44.0%) indicated they do not participate in any volunteer opportunities. One-fifth of the participants (20.1%) volunteer at Sun City Texas.
- Slightly over 80% of the participants live in a household with two people, while 16.8% indicated they were living alone.
- Over half of the participants (52.7%) have lived in Sun City Texas for over five years.
- Most participants (61%) do not own any pets, while just over one-quarter (27%) indicated having one pet.
- The overwhelming majority of respondents (92.9%) live in Sun City Texas the entire year, though 4.4% live elsewhere for at least three months, primarily between April and September.
- The majority of households (53.7%) own one golf cart.

MOSAK will be presenting the Board with key survey results during the February Board Workshop on Thursday, February 12, at 1 p.m. in the Social Center Ballroom. I encourage everyone to attend the Workshop and hear this presentation. In closing, I want to thank those residents who took the time to complete the annual satisfaction survey, and to assure all residents that the survey results and comments have been considered and will be used to help the CA improve its services to you, our stakeholders. Complete results from the survey will be available for resident review on our website after the February 12 presentation.

Current Issues Update

The Expansion Task Force Committees are starting to research their assigned issues. The Golf group is gathering data on the sport's future based on current national trends. The Research Subcommittee has begun scheduling focus group meetings and will be reaching out to our CA Committees for their valuable input.

This spring, Pulte will release its annual report on retirement community trends, providing an in-depth look at new concepts in marketing and amenities. The Amenities Group is presently collaborating with Chartered Clubs to establish a series of informative discussions on facility enhancement/modification and other anticipated needs, while the ETF Committee is reviewing collected subcommittee data to prioritize campus conveniences.

In the near future, the Developer will be receiving permits for the extension of Pedernales Falls Drive. Construction is geared up and ready to begin on this vital roadway. Also in construction news, the first new Somerset tract neighborhood is preparing to break ground – much construction on this tract will be completed before work commences on the Queens tract.

If this cold weather ever goes away, the next section of landscaping work will begin along Del Webb Boulevard. Thanks to a \$100,000 donation from the Developer, it is expected that far more of this project will be completed in 2015 than initially anticipated. Additionally, a larger quantity of impervious material will be placed, allowing us to save even more water.

Clearly, it's a busy and exciting time here in Sun City Texas. While many projects will take time, the work has already begun, so stay tuned!

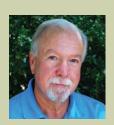

Hazardous Household Waste - Keep Yourself and the Environment Safe

Do you have items in your house that have the signal words "Danger," "Warning," "Caution," "Flammable", "Poison,"

"Corrosive," or "Toxic" somewhere on the label? These words usually appear above or below the contents of the container. Did you know that cooking sprays have the words, **Warning-Flammable**? Drain cleaners have the signal words, **Corrosive-Poison**.

Hazardous household waste is any chemical or item that has either (1) Been consumed (2) Expired or (3) Been "discarded." Hazardous household waste products should never be poured out on the ground, down the drain, or thrown out with regular household trash. Improper disposal can cause injury from contact or contaminate groundwater and drinking water.

Hazardous household waste products in your home might include:

- gasoline
- · paints, stains and paint thinners
- insect and weed killer (poison or toxic)
- · automotive oil, fuel additives
- batteries (wet cell), car, lawnmower etc.(corrosive)
- mercury (broken thermometers)
- · art and hobby chemicals

The above list is by no means inclusive. Other items that have gained the distinction of "Hazardous Waste" include computer, camera and cell phone batteries and fluorescent lights and tubes containing metal mercury.

If you use compact fluorescent lights (CFLs), these may be recycled at Home Depot; however, they will not take fluorescent tubes. These (along with the other items listed above) can be taken to the Williamson County Recycle Center via the City's voucher program for household hazardous waste.

TRANSPORTING HAZARDOUS WASTE

When you bring household hazardous waste items for disposal, be sure to pack and transport them safely by doing the

following:

- Keep products in original containers, when possible.
- If a container no longer has its original label and you know the contents, label it yourself.
- Don't mix products together! Dangerous chemical reactions can occur.
- Make sure products are sealed to prevent leaks and spills.
- Carefully pack containers in a sturdy cardboard box.
- If you use a plastic bag, please only use clear bags so the contents are easily visible.
- Transport the items in your vehicle away from all occupants and pets.

HAZARDOUS WASTE DROP-OFF SITE

The Williamson County Recycle Center is open to the general public on Thursdays and Fridays, from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., and on Saturdays from 8 a.m. to noon. It is open by appointment only on Tuesdays and Wednesdays from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. For additional information, please

visit the website www.mytexashhw.com or call 512-864-3240. Please note that the Recycle Center DOES NOT accept electronic waste.

Residents are able to obtain vouchers from the Georgetown Municipal Complex, 300-1 Industrial Avenue, and the Collection Station, 250 W.L. Walden Drive.

The vouchers allow City of Georgetown residential utility customers with active accounts to dispose of household hazards at the Williamson County Recycle Center at 495 CR 156, which is northeast of Georgetown on FM 971.

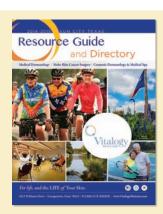
Update your info!

Water Conservation Methods: Soil Amendments

During the renovation of the Social Center landscape three years ago, we began testing a soil enhancement product to improve water retention. The product promised faster turf growth which would reduce the amount of water we might normally use on such a project by drawing its own moisture from the atmosphere. Since newly installed sod must be kept continually moist until roots are set, we gave it a try.

After prepping the soil for new turf, we added the fine powder with a drop spreader, following the product instructions. I got some of the powder on my arm and noticed it turning wet almost immediately. Despite this small sample of evidence, we were skeptical of the label's promises (as anyone who has ever been disappointed by a product can understand). Not wanting to lose our new sod investment, we began watering the usual three times per day, but it didn't take long for us to notice the turf becoming overly-soggy and the early signs of fungus development. We reduced our watering to a minimum level, and found that not only did we get the fungus under control, but a healthy root system was quickly established.

Our skepticism proved to be unwarranted – in three years, we've had no complaint and enjoy a turf that is lush and green in appearance, as well as reduced use of water and fertilizer.



TESTING ON LANDSCAPED MAINTAINED HOMES

To evaluate the benefits of the soil amendment product on existing turf, we decided to test it on select Landscaped Maintained Homes. As per the product's instructions, we began by mowing the lawn short, almost scalping it (you want to see soil), and providing heavy aeration with lots of holes in the ground which is essential for absorption by the ground. Once again, we applied the product with a drop spreader according to product instructions, followed by a thorough watering to activate the product. After only a brief period of time, we were able to see great results even in very shallow lawns, which held color when watered as infrequently as one day per week.

When the City restricted irrigation to two days per week in 2014, we found our soil holding moisture steadily. With a soil moisture sensor in place, we were able to monitor a surprising reduction in our scheduled gallons of water used (as mentioned last month, the key to success is a combination of proper product application, smart settings on controllers, and correct soil sensor calibration).

SUGGESTIONS FROM YOUR CA LANDSCAPING TEAM:

Based on our experiences, we can share these suggestions with you:

- Get a quote from an experienced lawn care professional early in the year.
- Your professional lawn care expert can access products directly from distributors and perform all steps required to ensure your lawn looks great and you see water savings.
- · Budget and don't take short cuts.
- Install sensors in spring to reap savings of the spring rains.
- Always get comparison quotes before making a final decision on how to spend your hard earned money.
- Get feedback from fellow residents who have already had experience with various products.
- For the Do-It-Yourselfer: there are several soil amendment and wetting agents available at your local home improvement and garden retailers such as AquaSmartTM, Miracle-Gro® or perlite.
- Always follow label directions, do not over water and don't use a rotary spreader when a drop spreader is specified, as powder products may blow away.
- Keep track of your scheduled gallons of water and your actual gallons used during the year to see how quickly your investment is paying off.

Sun City is doing its best to conserve resources for the future generations. If we can take it another step further, we could be the poster child for other HOAs. *Yours in landscaping*.

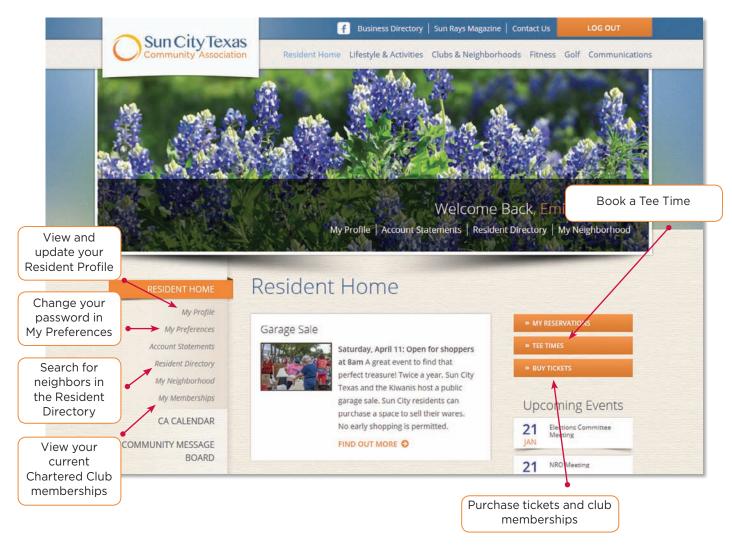

Bits of Info from Ginny's Desk

With spring approaching, it is a good time to take a look around your yard to see which plants need to be replaced. Our highly successful Waterwise and Firewise programs suggest using native plants, which require less water and are of a non-oily nature. Exhibit G, found on the website under Documents (Community Association Info > Documents > Design Guidelines) features a new spreadsheet listing plants and their suitability in various areas.

Don't forget to use the photo binder our Garden Club has assembled to help when choosing plants. This binder is available at the Social Center and Cowan Creek Monitors' Desks. As long as the size of the bed, material for the edging, and one plant per 100 square feet guidelines are followed, an application isn't necessary, even if you are changing out the edging of the bed. Just remember to keep all plants under 36" in the sight triangle of a corner lot and at least twenty feet from the rear perimeter of a golf course lot.

A number of landscape project worksheets have been developed by the Community Standards Office to help you with landscape projects that require a B-1 Application Form. The worksheets can be downloaded from the website, picked up from our office or emailed

to you at your request. They condense the Design Guidelines requirements, providing a simple checklist to ensure everything is provided for the Committee's review.

Valentine's Day is Saturday, February 14. As per page 55 of the Design Guidelines, decorations may be displayed for seven days prior to and seven days after the holiday. Feel free to put out hearts, flowers, and flags with cupids beginning February 7 until February 22!

COPs Update

By now, you have probably heard of Austin's hands-free ordinance, which made texting while driving illegal as of January 1. Hopefully, you learned of this law from the newspaper or a friend and not from an officer issuing you a ticket!

Violating this new law is a Class C Misdemeanor and offenders will be hit with a hefty \$500 fine. Seem excessive? Well, perhaps you haven't been paying attention. In the last three years, distracted driving has been responsible for more than 22,000 crashes and claimed 82 lives in the Austin area alone. According to TxDOT, one out of every five crashes in Texas is caused by a distracted driver, and in 2013, 459 Texans died as a result of these accidents.

So what, exactly, constitutes "distracted

driving"? The list may surprise you:

- Texting
- Using a cell phone for any reason*
- · Eating and drinking
- Talking to passengers
- Grooming
- · Reading, including maps
- · Using a navigation system
- · Watching a video
- Adjusting a radio, CD player or MP3 player
- * Hand-held cell phone use while driving is permitted only for contacting police about an emergency, accident or crime. Austin is currently leading the state in an effort to refocus on the task of driving. If some gadget diverts your attention from driving your car, truck, golf

cart or bicycle, or endangers the safety of a driver, passenger or bystander, it's illegal in Austin. More than 20 other cities (including San Antonio) have local ordinances prohibiting or limiting cell phone use and texting.

Texas does not yet have a statewide ban on cell phone use, but we do have a number of restrictions — bus drivers transporting children and novice drivers (those with learners' permits) are barred from using cell phones (hands-free or otherwise) while driving. Handheld phone use is also restricted in school zones.

If you travel with an electronic device, consider investing in one that's handsfree or which supports hands-free accessories. This will allow you to keep in touch while lowering your risk of distraction. And no matter what device you use, remember: stay safe, drive alert. That's what COPs do, always looking out for your safety!

COPs (Citizens on Patrol) needs you! Volunteer just four hours a month – drive, office staff (from your home, our cell phone) or perform maintenance tasks (gas up vehicles, take in for service or a car wash). Please call 512-966-1362, Monday–Friday 9:30 a.m. – 5 p.m.

Armadillos

Armadillos are prevalent in Sun City Texas. The most common armadillos in our area are the Texas species, the ninebanded armadillo; this species has a distinct shell casing made from bone and it has two large-shell casings covering the shoulders and rump with seven to nine bands in the middle. Usually, the male is a little larger than the female; both have short legs but can move very quickly. They have strong claws and a long, tapered tail, 14 to 17 inches long that is completely covered by bony rings. Armadillos use their tails to help jump three to four feet into the air when surprised.

Armadillos are solitary, nocturnal animals with large eyes, poor vision, and are most active before dawn and, occasionally, at dusk. They can dig burrows up to seven feet deep with their snouts and sharp claws. They use these tools to loosen the soil and then use their long, sticky tongues to catch insects, especially worms and grubs, which are their favorite food.

They can cause trouble by digging up



yards and golf courses and can be categorized as a nuisance because of the damage they can inflict on greens. If you spot an armadillo digging on your property, call a local pest control company for help in removing it. The Community Association does not provide assistance with removing armadillos. The best protection against armadillos, especially if grubs are found in your yard, is to eradicate the grubs. Products for grub eradication are: (1) Bayer Advanced Grub Control; (2) Omni Grub Killer; and (3) Bayer Complete Insect Killer.

Water Matters

With colder, wetter weather in this winter's forecast, I hope that all irrigation systems have been



turned to their "off" positions. If you feel that you must water, the city will allow up to two days of watering per week, based on your address. Exact guidelines can be found at their website (water. georgetown.org).

Last winter, several yards were unintentionally turned into ice gardens because irrigation controllers had not been adjusted. This could easily have been avoided if controllers had been shut off prior to the cold front's arrival. Keep yourself abreast of current weather forecasts, and you can save thousands of gallons of water each year.

- The danger of the Stasi secret police force cannot be understated as an ominous, ever-present force in day-to-day East German life. Friends, coworkers, and neighbors were all possible contributors to the Gestapo-inspired

- force, which contained an estimated 500,000 informants.
- We would like to clarify that Manfred Reimann's high school did not offer English classes of any

kind, and that he only learned the language on account of his father, who secured him private lessons from a retired teacher. Reimann's English education was further supplemented with blacklisted Western novels and through broadcasts from the American Forces Network (AFN Berlin), which broadcast the forbidden rock 'n' roll hits of Elvis, Buddy Holly, and Fats Domino.

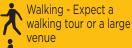

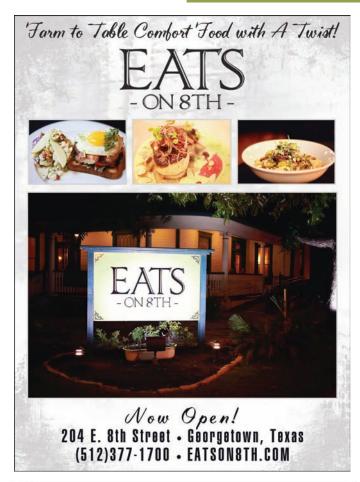

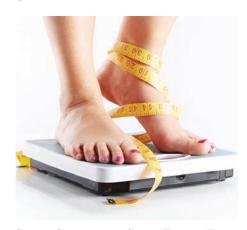

Athlete of the Month By Lynda Dufour

Kent Denton is a Texan, born and bred. A tall, strapping man at the age of 71, he was reared in the small town of Merkel and educated at Abilene Christian University. He's an avid outdoorsman with a fondness for hunting and fishing, a family man with a particular soft spot for his six grandchildren, and a fan of Blue Bell Ice Cream.

"I like food in general," says a smiling Kent, patting his belly. He admits his fondness for food is the reason he managed to pack on 30 extra pounds during his career as a pharmaceutical sales representative with Upjohn. Sixteen years retired, the scale had climbed to 230 before he began working out with Sun City Personal Trainer Don Moore three years ago. Today, Kent's weight is down to 209, thanks to twice weekly workouts with Don at the Cowan Creek Fitness Center.

Kent says he sought the guidance of a personal trainer not just to lose weight, but also to tone muscles and rebuild stamina, core strength and mobility. As an added benefit, he's seen a notable improvement in both his blood pressure and cholesterol numbers. Right from the start, Don's expertise helped him pinpoint a weaker right leg, the result of a painful high school football injury.

"Kent has always been consistent in his training, so he is a great example for others," says Don. "A very important aspect of remaining healthy and improving one's mobility and balance is to exercise consistently. Exercising under the direction of a personal trainer ensures that people will work out in an effective and safe manner. I've created thirty-minute sessions for Kent that work the major muscle groups in his body. He has improved not only his overall strength but his health as well."

Don also notes the importance of an active lifestyle. "Kent has not become sedentary in his retirement," he adds. "As a trainer, I don't subscribe to the 'no pain, no gain' theory, but I do tell clients to 'use it or lose it.' Kent has adhered to that counsel."

According to Kent, Don keeps him focused and motivated to "build on his success" and not relapse to unhealthy habits. "Don changes my routine and keeps it interesting," says Kent. "That helps me accomplish my goals

and keeps me moving forward. Exercise just helps me feel better in general. I always feel refreshed and have a great sense of accomplishment."

so let's start out by saying low *impact* aerobics does not mean low workout aerobics. While you begin the series working at your own level, the goal is to raise your heart rate, working your way up to an increased level of health and fitness over time. Over what period of time depends on the person – as for yours truly, I was slumped down on the bench in 15 minutes, attempting to look like I was taking notes but mostly seeming like a tuckered out wimp trying to escape the rigors of class. My wife, however, managed to keep up with the other participants, and now plans to take the class whenever possible.

It was hard not to notice the excellent levels of fitness of the participants in this class, which can be attributed to the energetic intensity of the workout. If you're wondering where the "low" part comes in, you'll find it in fewer injuries and reduced strain the workout puts on your bones and joints (particularly the

hips, knees, spine and ankles). So while low impact aerobics *will* build endurance, improve strength and coordination, enhance mobility and balance, and boost your overall cardiovascular health, it won't leave you feeling injured, overwhelmed, or feeling like you've wasted your time.

On that last point, I have to say that I heartily agree! With music that gets you moving and a friendly instructor encouraging you to sashay, mambo, and march, march, march your way around the floor, this class will get your blood pumping, your calories burning, and (if you let it) your booty shaking.

The low impact aerobics class includes 45 minutes of warmup and continuous movement to music, followed by stretch and core exercises. Classes are offered Monday/Wednesday/Friday at 8 a.m. and Tuesday/Thursday at 9:15 a.m. It's a lively, interesting class with a lot of variety, sure to shake you up (or maybe just start you out) with a fun fitness routine.

My Dog Buddy

Editor's Note: Love comes in many forms; not to be underestimated is the special bond that exists between humans and their pets. Resident David Clary shares with us the story of his dog, Buddy.

t had been some time since my last dog had unexpectedly died and, as I missed having a dog, I decided to go to the local animal shelter in Tool, Texas - just to look around a bit.

I told the woman working at the shelter that I would like to see what kind of selection they had, so she took me back to the kennel area. As soon as she opened the door, what appeared to be hundreds of dogs of all sizes, shapes and colors immediately started jumping up and down against their fenced enclosures, barking, "Pick me! Pick me! Pick me!" All of them were vying for my attention - well, all of them except for one. There, laying off to the rear and pretending to be asleep

(but peeking with one eye to see what all the fuss was about), a single dog hung back. It wasn't a puppy, but it wasn't full-grown either. My guess was somewhere around three to four months old. With thick white hair (neither short nor long) and buff-colored ears, it observed without ever moving a muscle. Somewhat overwhelmed with all the dogs, I stepped back, took a deep breath, and decided to leave empty-handed.

All week long as I drove back and forth to work, I kept thinking about that one dog. The one who kept to himself, not a care in the world. When Saturday rolled around again, I decided to go back to the animal shelter to take another look. As before, all the dogs went into their routine, jumping up and down, barking, "Pick me! Pick me! Pick me!" And, as before, that one same dog lay quietly, pretending to sleep but watching care-

fully with one eye open.

I told the employee I wanted to see that one - the one back there keeping all to itself. She opened the gate to the kennel and told me to go ahead to the play yard out back, that she would meet me there. Minutes later, she came out with the pup. As soon as she set that dog down, it took off, lickety-split, running 90 miles an hour back and forth, non-stop, all around that yard. Finally, I hollered out, "Hev, Buddy! Slow down and come here so I can see you!" His big brown eyes sparkled. He had this funny smile on his face, and his tongue was hanging out his mouth. On our way home, I told him that was going to be his name – Buddy. There was already a nice kennel at home that I had built next to my storage barn when I built my house, ready and waiting for Buddy. It had a concrete pad, enclosed by a chain link fence, adjacent to a huge oak tree that provided ample shade. The dog house matched my storage barn. My home sat on a channel of the lake, a heavily wooded property of about two and a half acres covered with huge oak trees. Buddy adapted quickly to his new surroundings.

I was amazed at how quickly Buddy learned the sound of my car, and how he was even faster to figure out when I'd be coming home from work. I could see him standing at the gate of his kennel before I even reached the corner of my street, his tongue hanging out and tail just a-wagging. As soon as I would open that gate, he'd be gone - running at lightning speed all over the property. One day, two cottontail rabbits were sitting outside the fence, gazing at Buddy. It was almost as if they were asking if he could come out and play. Buddy lay there dozing, but kept one eye on the rabbits, not overly concerned one way or the other. Later in the day, when I let Buddy out, he disappeared into the wooded lot next door. Abruptly, two cottontail rabbits came sprinting across the yard, Buddy just five seconds behind. They disappeared into the woods on the other side, only to reappear minutes later, Buddy still on the chase. This zigzag game of hide and seek quickly became a daily deal for all three creatures.

Buddy was a bright dog, and he knew there was more to the world than the wooded lots around him. I could search for him for hours, only to find him buried down to his rear in a nutria hole or armadillo den, trying to discover whatever might be inside. Other times, I'd find him blocks away, sitting on a neighbor's dock and barking at the fish. Though Buddy never had a worry in the world, he could sense when I was mad and make a break for the house, heading straight for his pen. There he'd sit, tongue hanging out, pretending to be asleep as though he had been there the whole time.

These adventures went on for many years, however, there came a day when I started noticing Buddy biting at his tail. Looking at it closer, I noticed something he'd clearly been after. I called my veterinarian. At the vet, they shaved the area, and concluded that a tumor was situated at the base of his tail. They suggested bobbing the tail to resolve the issue. Though I couldn't imagine Buddy without a tail, we decided it was the best option and scheduled the surgery for the upcoming Friday.

On the morning of the operation, I took Buddy in. The surgery would take a couple of hours and the vet had asked to keep him for observation. Later that day, I got a call – the veterinarian asked me to come back. As it turned out, when the vet shaved the whole area to prepare for surgery, he discovered that Buddy was riddled with cancers, making surgery a moot point. I asked him what options were available. The vet readily offered to get Buddy accepted to the A&M School of Veterinary Medicine, where veterinary students could try to resolve Buddy's illness with an assortment of "things." He would be kept there, in a cage, allowing students to work on him at their convenience, rather than me making trips back and forth. The vet informed me that I would probably get to visit him once in a while.

Buddy and I looked at each other. We both knew that this was not an option. Buddy wanted to enjoy being a dog as long as he could, and I wanted that for him as well.

Over the next few weeks, we carried on as best we could, though Buddy's energy was on a rapid decline. Neither of us could keep his sores clean, and it was becoming clear that the time was approaching.

Finally, I called the vet to make another appointment. I took off of work the whole week prior so Buddy and I could spend

just a few more days together. The day before his appointment, I told Buddy what to expect when we got to the vet, adding that I would be there with him the whole time. I filled up a tub with warm, soapy water to get him all gussied up. For once, he did not wimp out in water deeper than his feet.

On Friday morning it was time to go. Buddy knew that he always got to ride in the bed of the truck when we were going to the vet, and he headed straight for the vehicle. I helped him in. This time, however, my friend, Julie, came to drive the truck - I sat in the truck bed and rode alongside Buddy.

At the vet, Buddy was brought into the examining room, and I followed as usual. However, this time, the vet turned to me, saying, "David, this is where I draw the line. It is an emotional time and I do not allow pet owners in the examining room for this." I didn't know how to react or what to say, so I returned, dumbfounded, to sit in the waiting room. Several minutes later, the veterinarian came back out.

"David," he said, "Buddy won't let us near him." I replied, "I told him I would be there," and they showed me into the examining room. As soon as he saw me enter, Buddy calmed down. While we waited for the vet to administer the shot, I stroked his thick white hair. Buddy looked like he was pretending to be asleep, only this time, he didn't open his eye to see what all the fuss was about. I knew he was at peace. For weeks after I buried him, those two cottontail rabbits continued visiting Buddy's pen, sitting patiently as they waited for him to play. Fifteen years have passed since then, and I still find myself thinking about Buddy from time to time. Someday, I believe I will see him again. He'll be laying there, pretending to sleep, keeping one eye open to see what all the fuss is about.

February Tips for a Beautiful Water Wise Landscape

Spring is coming! On average, the last frost date for our region is March 15, so begin trimming now (except oak trees) so as to have early jobs completed, giving you plenty of time to trim roses and perennials come late February and early March. Remember: you want to trim before new growth, so review information here and online, then get your tools sharpened and ready!

A great online resource is: http://aggie-horticulture.tamu.edu/earthkind/landscape/proper-pruning-techniques/.

For your health and your trees' as well, the best practice is to hire a certified arborist. Suggestions for trimming bushes and perennials are as follows:

WHEN TO TRIM

Evergreen: Best for shape when dormant in winter

Shrubs and Trees which Bloom on This Year's Growth (Vitex; crape myrtle): January and early February

Deciduous Trees and Shrubs (nonblooming): Late winter

Shrubs, Roses, Fruit Trees: Late winter/early spring

Spring flowering trees and shrubs (Roses): off season or after flower

Root-Hardy Shrubs: everything above ground when new growth seen

Fall Blooming Perennials (Mexican mint marigold; Copper Canyon daisy; Mexican bush sage): Trimming stopped by end of July

Because trimming stimulates growth, do not prune in late fall.

TRIM WITH PURPOSE

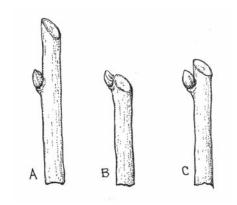
Trimming improves shape, bloom and plant structure. A shaped plant will be more attractive in your landscape and use less water. With spacing between plants, air circulation will reduce fungal disease and insect infestation.

TRIM TO MAINTAIN NATURAL SHAPE

First, remove old, damaged, and crossing branches from base. Then step back and allow the desired future growth shape be your guide. To rejuvenate an old, overgrown shrub, remove one-third of the oldest, tallest branches at or slightly above ground level before new growth starts. It is better to gradually renew a bush by removing a few branches annually than to harshly prune after many years' growth.

UNDERSTANDING PLANT GROWTH

When you trim, energy goes to other buds, which makes a more bushy plant. This is true with all plants. Cut on a slant 1/4" to 1/2" above a bud facing the direction in which you want new growth. (See illustration C below.) Do not leave a long stem stub, as it will die, turning brown and ugly.



FEBRUARY GARDENING TIPS

- Do not trim oaks now! The most dangerous time to prune oaks is February through June, as sap is moving at this time and beetles are at their most active.
- Clean up stray leaves, winter debris, and weeds, but avoid walking on or digging in wet soil to prevent compaction.
- Distribute pre-emergent on turf by February 15.

- Late winter is good time to transplant perennials that you want to move to other areas. Thin seedlings of reseeding annuals and perennials to ensure proper spacing.
- Be sure all plants are mulched 2-3" with organic mulch to moderate temperature, slow evaporation and allow release of nutrients to plants.
- Before a freeze, water plants for hydration, but do not water during freezing temperatures.

Giddy Up, Mules! By Jeanne Lubey

Editor's Note: In the fall of 2014, Jeanne and Darrel Lubey took off on a monthlong tour of the western United States, visiting several national parks, including Grand Canyon National Park. The Sun City couple had previously visited the canyon several times, and Jeanne was interested in participating in a two-day mule ride to the bottom of the canyon.

"I thought it was just fascinating," she said, though it would take Jeanne several years before Darrel would share her zeal for the mule ride. Eventually,

Darrel relented, and the couple prepared for their adventure by exercising at the Fitness Center.

The mule ride journey is a downward trek to the bottom of the canyon but, because of the terrain, the couple was surprised by the number of uphill climbs required to reaching their destination. Jeanne is proud of her achievement. "This was an accomplishment," she said. "Almost as much so as getting my master's degree!"

SEPTEMBER 19, 2014

What an exhausting day, an experience

as vast and as grand as this canyon itself. We have yet to climb our way out of this giant hole and I have no idea how we can manage it, with or without a mule. Darrel is in worse shape than I. How do hikers do it?

We got up early in the morning, bushytailed and ready to meet at the mule corral. We were explained the dos and don'ts of the trip and offered every opportunity to back out. There were two wranglers, named Kevin and Alison, ten dudes, Darrel and myself. Each of us

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was assigned a mule - Darrel's mule was named Dusty, a big white guy, and I got a mule named named Ike. I soon discovered that Ike wore a muzzle on account of his tendency to steal grasses from along the side of the trail.

We departed, Kevin in the lead and Alison following up at the tail of our train. Clipclopping our way down Bright Angel Trail, the sun shone brilliantly. The canter of our mule's hooves as they struck the rocky trail provided an ever-present rhythm to our ride. I went over the wranglers' instructions in my head: Trust your mule. Stay together. Trust your mule. Don't lean right or left in the saddle if you want to stay on the cliff. Trust your mule. Use your mule motivator (riding crop). Stay together. So it went, clip-clop, all the way to the bottom of the canyon.

Three hours later, we had clipped and clopped our way into Indian Creek Gardens, an oasis halfway down the Canyon. Already weary riders, the break was a welcome relief. Hikers sat in clumps of humanity, too tired to lift their heads as we arrived. "Wet your heads and shirts at the mule tank," said Alison, and something told me I'd better do as told - they knew what was coming more than I. The break passed quickly and, just twenty minutes after arriving, we re-mounted our mules and set off into the valley below, already missing the shade of the yellow-green cottonwood trees.

Not even the ache of six hours on the back of a mule could dampen our spirits as we took in the exquisite beauty before us, riding past two hundred foot high vertical cliffs pointing toward a blue sky. Kevin told us about the history of the canyon, pointing out petroglyphs left by ancient peoples and fault lines from tectonic plates. Turning a corner, we found ourselves ascending a mountain of vertical steps, daring ourselves to glance back at the chasm 2,000 feet below. Red-streaked rocks transformed to darker tones of gray and black, until the canyon walls resembled waves of

chocolate melting in the sun, dripping over stone sheets of gray-green and rust red. In every shift of the light the colors changed, and showed us yet another personality of the canyon.

Up and up, past jagged, scrambledegg like pillars and over stony trails, we climbed, each step taken by Ike and his companions ringing out in the canyon. This was not a trail ride - it was an endurance test, a marathon, a fight against nature. Clambering up the narrow trail of Devil's Corkscrew, we held our breath as a 2,000 vertical drop to our left matched the 600 hundred foot cliffs on our right. At the aptly named "Jesus Corner", we saw before us nothing but air, and I recalled the advice of our wranglers from that morning: Trust your mule. I decided that Ike knew where he was going, and it was not down. The mule train

forged confidently (obliviously?) ahead, and as Ike walked the edge, I looked deep into the depths of the corkscrew to see the famed Devil's Furnace below.

After the arduous effort upward, imagine our surprise to discover that the descent would be even more painful! Some of poor Ike's steps were over a foot in depth. Shifting in the saddle helped to absorb the shock, but my knees still hurt. More accurately, my body hurt. I hurt so much, I didn't even notice the steady rise in temperature as we neared the bottom of the chasm and entered the Furnace.

Surrounded by hundreds of cragged formations, the Furnace is a narrow, funnel-like region, some portions barely wide enough for our mules to squeeze through. As we rode down the interior edge of the funnel, I felt as though we were being sucked into its depths. The air grew thicker and thicker, almost to the point of stifling until, finally, at the bottom, relief greeted us in the form of a 105 F breeze. Coupled with 90% humidity, I could see why it was known as a furnace! Another switchback, another turn, and suddenly the canyon opened before us



and at last we saw the Colorado River. Churning below us, wide and wild, it was filled with treacherous rapids and foolhardy rafters. But then, our journey had been no cakewalk, either.

I looked back to see Darrel not looking too frisky; in fact, I was plenty worried about him. I alerted Kevin, who immediately dismounted and poured cold water over Darrel's head and back. As Darrel hydrated, Kevin's radio crackled to life – a helicopter was preparing for lift off, and we were to stay put until further notice. The break was a welcome relief to us all. Across the river, the helicopter hovered over the canyon with a long rope dangling from its belly. We later learned a hiker had fallen.

and we had witnessed a rescue mission. Making our way to Phantom Ranch, where we would spend the night, Kevin kept a close eye on Darrel who, despite the exhaustion, would recover just fine with a meal and some rest. As we unwound for the evening, I was happy we could close our eyes and know we were in a good place.

SEPTEMBER 20, 2014

The next morning the alarm clock sounded at 5:30 a.m. To say we were sore and exhausted would have been an understatement, but there was breakfast to be had and we weren't going to miss it. We'd be heading up the South Kaibab Trail today, which, though three miles shorter than yesterday's trail, would be steeper by 400 feet.

Clip-clopping our way upward, we marveled at the vast expanse of the canyon. Over multiple switchbacks and hairpin turns, we learned the names of every pinnacle, butte, and shale, as well as terms for the various formations throughout the canyon. Ribbons of color streaked horizontal across the rocks, which were as varied and interesting as their hues. Diagonal lines intersected with vertical, perpendicular and even

horizontal lines, then disappeared, only to reappear unexpectedly, leaving my eyes disoriented as I tried to determine where one began and another ended. We passed enormous stones stacked one on top of another, like pancakes. Others sat balanced against each other, looking as though they might fall any minute. Light bounced across the canyon walls, changing shapes and colors without rhyme or reason. In the distance, a thunderstorm loomed.

The higher we climbed, the more we ached in places long forgotten. Even my stomach muscles were sore. Alison, one of our wranglers, said it was two weeks before the pain stopped for her, but the bone-aching fatigue took longer. We stopped often to rest our mules. Lugging us folks up and down this canyon was

hard work, and we appreciated every step they took.

As our mule train forged on, Alison pointed to a distant ridge some 900 feet above us. "That," she said, "is where we are going." Everyone groaned - I'm sure I even heard the mules groan. Carved into the side of a huge rock known as The Chimney, our trail looked like a zigzag line drawn right up the face of the enormous stone pillar. I felt sorry for my mule, but not as sorry as I was feeling for myself. Drawing closer, we were able to see tiny, ant-like people making their way up the side of the mountain. Our ascent began, and we became one of them, slowly clip-clopping our way to the stone peak. The wranglers told us ascending was easier than descending because gravity's downward pull was

not as intense, but looking down the edge of this steep ridge, gravity seemed pretty intense to me.

Finally, on the last zag of the trail's ladder, we reached the end of the last leg of our journey. Our party cheered, inspiring a crowd of nearby tourists to cheer as well. If they only knew where we'd been! Traversing the bottom of the Grand Canyon is like traveling to the moon and back - or at least, that's how our bodies felt. We rode our mules to the barn in triumph, dismounting as our wonderful wranglers hummed "Pomp and Circumstance" and presented us with diplomas and a sincere handshake. We were now official members of The Order of Mule Skinners of the Grand Canyon, and we have the sheepskins to prove it!

GolfNow - What it is and why it's important

Have you seen the TV commercial with the funny old Scottish man with the white beard who is trying to get a tee time? At the end of the commercial he always says in a strong Scottish accent, "Go Play!" That's an ad for an internet feature available nationwide called GolfNow.

Many golfers in our area take advantage of Golf Now to play golf here in Sun City. Sun City Texas golfers play approximately 155,000 rounds each year across our three wonderful championship golf courses. Even with this many rounds played, there are frequently tee times that are not booked by Sun City resident golfers. Instead of letting these unreserved tee times remain unused, our golf operation staff works to fill these tee times and, as a result, bring additional revenue into our golf operations. To do this, we utilize the online booking engine Golf Now.

GolfNow is a website (GolfNow.com) that allows golfers to book tee times from the convenience of their home or mobile phone. Because the unused tee times are often less desirable times, the golf operation offers a discount to entice golfers to book these times. In general, the discount is 10-20 percent off of the normal public greens fees, giving interested golfers an incentive to book a time that would otherwise go unused.

The Sun City golf operation staff strives to offer resident golfers the lowest rates possible while still allowing for the appropriate maintenance of our three golf courses. Golf Now tee time bookings have played an important role in our operations budget, as it brings in roughly \$200,000 per year in revenue. Without this revenue source, the ability to offer the competitive pricing for resident golfers would be much more difficult. It should be noted that



GolfNow is a public website and Sun City resident golfers are able to book these times just like anyone else. Keep in mind, however, that all GolfNow tee times are controlled by the golf staff and are limited to non-prime times of day so that Sun City residents continue to get the highest priority on preferred tee times.

Taking Care of your Golf Courses

News from the SC Stacks

Have you ever wondered, "What if?"

You're not alone – in fact, an entire literary genre is devoted to the question. Popularly called "alternate history," works of this genre explore how differently life could have been if even something as mundane as the weather had been just slightly altered. From chance encounters to battle outcomes, our present is dictated by a past which could easily not have happened.

Editor Robert Crowley has compiled a riveting collection of essays from historians exploring such possibilities. Titled What If? Eminent Historians Imagine What Might Have Been, this anthology features many writers popular in our library, including Stephen Ambrose, Caleb Carr, John Keegan, and David Mc-Cullough, exploring hypothetical shifts in history. What if Pontius Pilate hadn't ordered Jesus Christ's crucifixion, or if Abraham Lincoln decided against the abolition of slavery? What if the Allied invasion of D-Day had failed, or the Mongols succeeded in conquering Europe? These and other topics offer a very different look at world history as we know it. You can find this book in Dewey 900.

An interesting book I've been reading lately places its focus a little closer to home. Titled *Then Everything Changed:* Stunning Alternate Histories of American Politics: JFK, RFK, Carter, Ford, Reagan, author Jeff Greenfield presents an engaging series of alternatives so well written, they almost seem as though they truly were "the way it was." This book is located in American History section,

Dewey 970.

Though many "What If" books are focused on the facts, alternative history works can be fictional as well. Along with co-author William B. Forstchen, Newt Gingrich has written a series of books about World War II, pitting Admiral Yamamoto against Admiral Halsey. Two of their books currently in our library - Pearl Harbor and Days of Infamy — are enjoyable reads for a journey down a fictitious (rather than historically factual) course.

Philip Roth (author of *The Human Stain* and *Portnoy's Complaint*) has written several alternative histories, including *The Plot Against America*, in which Charles Lindberg defeats Franklin Roosevelt for the 1940 presidential election, only to open negations with Hitler and bring many troubles to American Jews. Quite a good, dramatic read from a Pulitzer Prize-winning author.

The *Ring of Fire* series by Eric Flint takes a different spin on the alternate history genre as time-travelers venture back to the Thirty Years' War. Stephen King also explores this concept in his time-traveling novel, *11/22/63*.

Other authors of fiction to look for: Michael Chabon, Harry Turtledove, Seth Grahame-Smith, Stephen Baxter, Douglas Niles with Michael Dobson, Robert Conroy, and Peter Tsouras.

I have been fascinated by alternate history ever since I read a book on changes in U.S. and world history if the losing candidate in presidential elections had won. I don't remember the name of the book; it

was a collection of short essays and didn't go into a lot of detail as I recall, but it set off my thoughts into "what-ifs" that can be very interesting. Do you ever wonder what post-9/11 would have been like if Al Gore had been president? Even closer to home, would you be living in Sun City Texas if Sam Houston and the Texans had not won independence from Mexico? If Santa Anna had not surrendered (he had superior man-power and weapons, but he was with a prostitute at the time of attack), Mexico would have had much more land and resources and the United States would have been greatly diminished

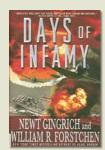
Alternate histories can be very interesting and fun to read. Try one sometime!
